From Monday, June 17h through Friday, July 12h, 2024, the Los Angeles Nishi Hongwanji Betsuin and Senshin Buddhist Temple will sponsor its 35th annual Saishin Dōjō (西心道場) Dharma School program (Since 1987). "Dōjō —道場 " is the ancient word for a Buddhis Temple, meaning a place where awakening is cultivated. "Sai — 西" means "nishi" or "west", from Nishihongwanji (西本願寺) and "shin — 心 " means kokoro or "mind/body", from Senshin Temple — 洗心寺 hence Saishin Dōjō

The program will consist of an all-day instruction program from 8:30am to 3:30pm with pick-up service until 6:00pm sharp. The program is an inter-connected one and requires that students participate from 8:30am ~3:30pm. Full participation by students is required for fullest effect of the various inter-related programs.

The program will include:

- 1. Instruction in reading, math, writing, and language skills taught by California credentialed teachers who are also Dharma School teachers or involved in temple sanghas.
- 2. Programs in Buddhist culture taught by qualified professionals. Programs this year will include sitting and walking meditation, exercise, Japanese foods, music, temple etiquette, Ikebana, Japanese language vocabulary, ceramics, Bon Odori, dance, flute, tie-dye, Jūdo, calligraphy, art, Bugaku ancient dance, Gagaku ancient music, student taiko, hashi etiquette, etc. Each day will begin with students participating in the morning omairi service.
- 3. A registered nurse is on staff.
- 4. Children are not allowed to bring cell phones or electronic games, trading cards, or any kind of toys. Emphasis is on real social interaction.

Classes are limited to those children of temple members who will be entering the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th grades in the Fall of 2024. Enrollment is limited to 15 students per class.

The student's parent or guardian must be registered members of a temple and provide proof of membership as provided for in the registration form. This form is sent to the parents of last year's students. New student registration forms are made available on April 1st, and students are taken on a first come first served basis. Registration forms may be picked up at local temples. The registration is taken as they come to Senshin Temple at 1311 W. 37th St., Los Angeles, Calif. 90007. Those forms without signatures confirming membership are held until such time as confirmation is obtained. The space for your child cannot be saved without proof of temple membership, and those forms that are completely filled out will be accepted before those forms that are incomplete.

#### **Registration Fees:**

- 1. Children whose <u>parents</u> are registered members of the sponsor-temples, Nishihongwanji Betsuin or Senshin Temple: <u>\$650.00</u>
- 2. Children whose <u>parents</u> are registered members of other Buddhist temples: \$700.00

The registration fee **includes**:

- 1. All excursion entry fees and transportation fees.
- 2. Bottled water for Saishin Dojo fundraiser at Nishi Betsuin Carnival.
- 3. One Saishin Dojo T-shirt for year 2024.

Additional T-shirts may be purchased for \$10 per t-shirt (see registration form)

Parents who wish to participate in their child's outings are asked to get prior permission from the teacher and be willing to pay their own expenses. Such inquiries must be made at least a week in advance, as group entry tickets are reserved in advance. Friends of Saishin Dōjō students are **not** allowed to join the excursions.

Children with special needs will only be accepted on an individual basis. Please include with your application form the specific special needs of your child. Without such notification and acceptance by our staff, before the first day of class, we reserve the right to terminate your child's participation in the program. We are not able to provide one-on-one supervision for any student.

The 6<sup>th</sup> grade class has the additional option of attending a 5-day camping experience at the San Luis Obispo Temple from Sunday, July 14<sup>th</sup> through Thursday, July 18<sup>th</sup> 2024. The total cost for the 5 days is \$700.00. This includes all room and board costs, transportation and all entry fees. The program includes the daily meditation and omairi schedules experienced at Saishin Dōjō, a toban schedule of serving and cleaning up after meals, daily excursions to tide pools, sand dunes, lakes, vegetable farms, craft projects, etc. This is all under the supervision of experienced camp counselors as well as the Saishin Dōjō 6<sup>th</sup> grade teacher, a cooking staff, and licensed nurse.

# REQUEST FOR MEDICATION TAKEN DURING SAISHIN DOJO/SAN LUIS OBISPO CAMPOUT POLICY

- 1. Prescription medications must be clearly labeled by a U.S. dispensing pharmacy and contain the following information: (consistent with prescription of authorized licensed health care provider)
- a) Student's full name, b) Physician's name, c) Dosage, schedule, and route. How long medication is to be taken ie: 1 year or short-term: (Date medication is to be discontinued or number of days medication is to be administered.)
- 2. In addition to a home supply, parent/guardian may request a second labeled bottle from the pharmacy for school use.
- 3. Non-prescription (over the counter) medications that have been authorized by this request, may be administered at Saishin Dojo and/or San Luis Obispo only if the medication is provided in the original container.
- 4. Request for Medication to be Taken During Saishin Dojo Hours must be renewed annually.
- 5. Parent/Guardian will notify the nurse or site administrator and provide a new Request for Medication to Be Taken During School Hours when there is a change in the student's medication, health status or authorized health care provider.
- 6. The school administrator or the administrator's designee will assume responsibility for placing the medication in a locked cabinet, storage unit or locked refrigerator.
- 7. The administrator, the administrator's designee, or nurse will assume responsibility for returning unused medication to the parent/guardian at the end of the program.
- 8. If medication must be taken while a student is on a field trip, arrangements must be made through the nurse.
- 9. All injectable medications require special arrangements. a. Injectable medications, such as insulin, used on a regular or as needed basis must be administered by licensed health care providers and require special arrangements. b. Injectable medications, which are to be given on an emergency basis, require special arrangements and training of staff by the nurse.
- 10. Each medication requires a separate written authorization.
